●Arrival of Prefectural Scholarship Students in Kagoshima●

On May 16th, two students from Brazil and Peru, joined by another Brazilian student on May 29th, arrived in Kagoshima to begin their lives here as prefectural scholarship students. The aim of the exchange is for international students, whose relatives have roots in Kagoshima, to study at universities in the prefecture to strengthen the students' knowledge of the prefecture and nurture talent that will contribute to closer ties between Kagoshima Prefecture and the countries they came from. Due to the impact of the novel coronavirus pandemic, we were unable to welcome students in 2020 and 2021, and had to put the program on hold. However, we were glad to finally welcome students to Kagoshima again in May this year.

The three prefectural-sponsored students will study their respective subjects at Kagoshima University, staying in Kagoshima until February next year for a total of 10 months.
