■ Traditional Indigo Dyeing: The Charm of Japan Blue

Do you know that you can try your hand at the traditional art of indigo dyeing here in Kagoshima?

Today, let's take a trip down to Minamisatsuma, where a little studio called Aizomeya is still keeping this traditional art alive.

What is traditional indigo dyeing?

Known as *aizome* in Japanese, it is a 100% natural and chemical-free process that is one of Japan's traditional dyeing techniques.



A series of intricate fermentation processes result in a dye that produces a beautifully vivid and long-lasting deep indigo blue, and has been renown worldwide as 'Japan Blue'. In fact, it can even be described as the symbolic colour of Japan.

Indigo is said to be one of the oldest plant dyes in existence, and the history of it in Japan dates back a long way. However, it was in the Edo period (1603-1868) where it rose to prominence due to the increase in cotton clothing that takes indigo dye well, and as a result became widely popular among the masses.

Foreign people who visited Japan at that time thought of the rich deep hue as a symbol of

Japan, and the name 'Japan Blue' was coined by a visiting British scholar in the 1870s.

Nowadays, chemical dye is used for many indigo products instead.

But thanks to the dedicated craftsmen who have inherited and passed down the traditions and techniques throughout the years, this traditional craft has been kept alive and going strong even today.



Aizomeya



Surrounded by lush mountains, natural scenery and fresh air, the studio Aizomeya offers an engaging indigo dyeing experience, as well as an adjoining store selling clothing and accessories dyed in the striking indigo blue.

The master, Mr. Kamizono, has over 30 years of experience and carefully guided us throughout.

The Dyeing Experience

Firstly, he introduces us to the large vats of fermenting dye around the studio, and gives a brief introduction of the fermentation process and raw materials used.

I also learnt that unlike what I had imagined, the fermented dye liquid is actually alive and full of fickle-

minded microorganisms that has to be fed, nurtured, and has a direct impact on the final

colour outcome. Even with the same raw materials, the slight variations in each vat can actually result in different hues of blue!

He then explains the various techniques such as *Danzome* (gradation dip-dyeing) and *Shiborizome* (tie-dyeing), and has us decide on our desired pattern and item (handkerchief, bandana or scarf).

After deciding on a scarf with a gradation pattern, I started off carefully dyeing the entire base first, and then gradually tying off a section and repeatedly dipping the rest of the fabric thereafter.

In between dips, the fabric is hung to air-dry, and this is continued until the desired shade and pattern is achieved.

At this point, the colour is a deep green. Once satisfied with the shade, the fabric is thoroughly washed and then dried.

It is then that we could see the final fruits of our labour, and the beautiful blues are revealed!

As I have always enjoyed handicrafts, it was a very enjoyable experience to learn about the ancient craft of traditional indigo dyeing through this hands-on experience. Thanks to Mr. Kamizono, the workshop was both very fun and educational!

My appreciation for how much goes into the production of indigo dye and its products has only risen as I learned about and experienced this incredible process.

Trying my hand at it really strikes home how challenging the entire process is. The delicate fermentation process, the labour-intensive dyeing process, and the design craftsmanship; each step is indeed a labour of love!

The fact that this is also a traditional artform passed down through generations makes this really meaningful too.

If you're looking to get an authentic taste of traditional Japanese craftsmanship and an afternoon of wonderfully-enriching experiences, look no further than Aizomeya and its all-natural indigo dyeing experience!

■ 27th March: The Governor greeted visitors and participated in a ceremony to commemorate the launch of charter flights by Vietnam Airlines

Then, he greeted tourists from Vietnam arriving in Kagoshima, welcoming their arrival and handing out novelty items.



● 16th February: Completion Ceremony and Debriefing Presentations for the FY2023 Kagoshima Overseas Technical Trainee and Prefectural Scholarship Student Programmes ●

Every year, Kagoshima Prefecture hosts a number of Overseas Technical Trainees from developing nations, who are able to contribute to the development and prosperity of their home countries. Alongside this, a number of individuals are selected from among the descendants of people who emigrated from Kagoshima to other countries, and are hosted by the prefecture as Prefectural Scholarship Students who can contribute to strengthening relations between Kagoshima and their home countries.

On 16th February 2024, debriefing presentations and a completion ceremony were held at the Prefectural Office for the three Overseas Technical Trainees (from Brazil, Paraguay and China) and three Prefectural Scholarship Students (from Brazil and Peru) that participated in the FY2023 programmes.

At the completion ceremony, programme participants were given completion certificates and commemorative gifts by Vice-Governor Fujimoto. This was followed by a debriefing session, during which each technical trainee and each scholarship student delivered presentations about their daily lives in Kagoshima and what they had learned at their training institute or university.

The event was attended by the many people who had supported the participants, including representatives from each host institute and university, as well as the accommodation facilities and homestay families.

As they return home, we look forward to seeing the participants use the skills, knowledge and experience they gained here to contribute to the development of their home countries, all while they continue to forge stronger bonds between their countries and Kagoshima!
