● Looking back on my life in Kagoshima – By Sacay Fabiana

Nice to meet you! My name is Fabiana Sacay, and I am from Brazil. I studied abroad here in Kagoshima Prefecture from April 2024 for 10 months.

On my mother's side, my family has roots in Kaseda City, Kagoshima Prefecture. My great-grandfather immigrated to Brazil in 1927, and later, my grandfather followed in 1952.

The reason I wanted to study abroad in Kagoshima was to connect with my relatives in Japan and learn more about my roots. While in Kagoshima, I was fortunate to meet my grandfather's younger brother's family, the family of a deceased relative, and even my grandfather's former classmates in Kaseda.

I also visited my grandfather's elementary school, the place where my great-grandfather lived before immigrating, and my ancestors' graves. I am truly grateful for this experience.

At Kagoshima University

I studied at Kagoshima University and joined the Food Function and Nutrigenomics Laboratory in the Faculty of Agriculture.

Since I had the opportunity to study in Kagoshima, I decided to extract samples from 26 types of citrus fruits and conduct a comparative study. They include *Sakurajima Komikan* (a tiny local mandarin orange) and *Kikaijima Mikan* (Kikai Island Citrus), which are local specialties.

My research focused on analyzing the antioxidant capacity of functional components in fruit, polyphenol quantification, and carbohydrate decomposition enzyme inhibitory activity. I was very happy to obtain interesting results.

I also had various experiences that deepened my understanding of Japanese culture. One of the most memorable was wearing a

kimono to the Chrysanthemum Festival at Sengan-en Garden and participating in a tea ceremony, where I learned about its detailed etiquette.

I also had the opportunity to dance with my friends at the Ohara Festival. Additionally, I actively participated in international exchange events in Kagoshima, where I interacted with other international students and learned about multicultural coexistence.

Moreover, I became interested in Kagoshima's traditional culture and artifacts. Before coming to Japan, I knew little about Kagoshima, but the longer I lived here, the more I learned about the region—its specialty products, the Kagoshima dialect, and the history of the Meiji Restoration.

This experience significantly changed my perspective. One of the most impressive sights was Sakurajima, an active volcano that erupts frequently. On clear days, the view of Kinko Bay and Sakurajima is breathtaking, and in winter, I was amazed to see Sakurajima covered in snow. I also found the history of Kinko Bay fascinating.

Even though I lived in Japan for 10 months, I often felt frustrated and disappointed that my Japanese skills did not improve as much as I had hoped. However, as time passed, my desire to communicate more fluently in Japanese grew stronger. I am determined to continue studying Japanese even after returning to Brazil.

Finally, I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to Kagoshima Prefecture and the Kagoshima Kenjinkai Brazil for giving me this opportunity. I also want to thank my family for their constant support, the relatives I met in Japan, the professors who guided me, and everyone who showed me kindness.

●11 January : Attended the Lighting Ceremony of 2025 Pingtung Festival of Lights●

We visited “Yumaowu,” a supermarket in Taiwan that sells Japanese food ingredients, and exchanged opinions with its representative.

Yumaowu currently offers over 50 products made in Kagoshima and has made significant contributions to expanding sales channels and raising awareness of Kagoshima products, such as by hosting a Kagoshima fair every year since 2015. For his contributions to date, we presented a letter of appreciation to Mr. Xie Ming-da, the representative of Yumaowu who also gave us a tour of the store. In addition, we requested his cooperation in further expanding the range of Kagoshima products they carry.

On the day of our visit, many customers were seen purchasing the store’s bento boxes, which featured Kagoshima-produced *Wagyu* beef and kumquats. A Kagoshima Fair is also planned for February at the store, and we will continue collaborating with Yumaowu to expand sales channels, ensuring that products from Kagoshima Prefecture are able to reach people in Taiwan.


●13 January : Courtesy visit to the Japan-Taiwan Exchange Association Taipei Office ●

● 23 January : Held the Welcome Ceremony for Foreign Skill Interns under the Cooperation Agreement between Kagoshima Prefecture and Vietnam National University ●

We held a welcome ceremony for Foreign Skill Interns based on the cooperation agreement between Kagoshima Prefecture and Vietnam National University of Agriculture, where the Governor delivered a welcome speech.

Previously in July 2023, we had visited Vietnam and signed a cooperation agreement with the university, working toward the acceptance of Foreign Skill Interns in the agricultural sector.

The nine Foreign Skill Interns welcomed this time have been undergoing Japanese language training since June last year, followed by training on Kagoshima's culture, environment, and agriculture since October.

The earliest arrivals began their practical training in December and have been working hard alongside the farmers who have accepted them.

We hope that the Foreign Skill Interns will continue to excel, that the friendship and trust between Kagoshima Prefecture and the Vietnam National University of Agriculture will deepen, and that agriculture in both Vietnam and Kagoshima will continue to thrive.

Tourism Information in Kagoshima

●25 January : The 25th World's Best Sakurajima Daikon Radish Contest ●

The 25th World's Best Sakurajima Daikon Radish Contest was held at the same time as the 2025 Hinoshima Megumikan Rest Stop Appreciation Festival on Sakurajima.

In addition to the main contest, there was a weight-guessing competition for Sakurajima-grown daikon radishes, an all-you-can-stuff vegetable event, and a fun raffle.

●14 January : Ibusuki Nanohana Marathon●

The Ibusuki Nanohana Marathon is the earliest-held annual event of the year and is known for its warm and welcoming atmosphere. City residents come out in droves to cheer on participants along the route, and runners are treated to plenty of local delicacies.

The running course passes through breathtaking fields of *nanohana* (canola) flowers in full bloom, and features scenic views of Kyushu's largest lake, Lake Ikeda, as well as Mt. Kaimon, also known as the "Mt. Fuji of Satsuma". While the course has a considerable elevation profile, the generous 8-hour time limit makes it accessible even for beginners.

Although entry numbers were limited, from 2024 onwards the marathon was held alongside a new 12-km Fun Run: Lake Ikeda Course.

The finishing line is right along the shore of Lake Ikeda, offering stunning views of Mt. Kaimon, Lake Ikeda, and the vibrant *nanohana* flower fields.

Many runners visited Ibusuki for the event, creating a lively and festive atmosphere.
